Over 50 years on the academic staff of Universities in Australia — from 1967 as Professor of Physiology at the University of Melbourne — as well as several periods as either Research Fellow or Visiting Professor at various Overseas Universities in the UK, Germany, Canada and the USA . Now Emeritus Professor, University of Melbourne.



Extensively involved with both undergraduate and graduate teaching in Physiology and Applied Physiology and author of over 100 papers in International Scientific journals on experimental pathology, lipid metabolism and atherosclerosis.
After taking early retirement in 1989, completed a theological degree (at Ridley College, Melbourne).

Appointed Academic Fellow at Ridley College in 1994/5 and during this time tutored in both Theology and in Biblical Studies (OT).

Science/Faith interests

Involved at the Science/Faith interface for many years, both as a member of the Australian Research Scientists Christian Fellowship (as Australian President during the 1970's) and now as a Fellow of ISCAST. Executive Sec. of the Victorian Chapter of ISCAST. (1991- 2000).

In 1997 initiated and acted as program director for a course in Science and Christian Belief at Ridley College—awarded a Templeton Course program award in 1998.
Awarded a Templeton Continuation award in 2002 for continued activity in the Science Faith interface.

Have acted as occasional examiner for postgraduate degrees in Science and Religion for the Australian College of Theology.

Member Editorial Board *Science and Christian Belief*.

From 1999 to 2003 conducted courses in Science and Religion for the University of the Third Age.
